LOS ANGELES, California — The Korean Cultural Center of Los Angeles will host a private, advanced screening of "Earl." a documentary feature film directed by Emmy award winning storyteller Ty Kim on Thursday, April 4 at 7:00pm. Seating will be limited and open to the general public for this special event. RSVP for general public is available at kccla.org.

This is the extraordinary story of a true pioneer whose life spans generations and worlds. It is also the story about the power of music to transform lives. For the first time, audio interviews of the American composer Earl Kim (1920-1998) have been unearthed and presented in this stirring narrative. The film showcases some of the most accomplished composers and artists including the violinist Itzhak Perlman who recorded an album with the composer.

Earl was born into abject poverty in a small town in central California. His parents were immigrants from Korea with no formal music training. Earl learned the keyboard from a church organist and later a pianist/composer who taught Earl free of charge for seven years. Earl went on to study with some of the greatest composers including Arnold Schoenberg, Roger Sessions and Ernest Bloch. Earl's plan to follow in their footsteps was interrupted by World War II.

In 1941, Earl was drafted and served his country as a US Army Air Force Combat Intelligence Officer. He flew fifty feet above Nagasaki one day after the atomic bomb was dropped. When he returned home, Earl refused to sign The Loyalty Oath and stood up against McCarthyism. He was fired by UC Berkeley. Despite this setback, Earl went on to teach at Princeton for 15 years, and Harvard for 23 years.

The film has been invited to be shown at Harvard, Princeton, Lehigh, Rice, Festival Mozaic and other locations. A Carnegie Hall screening is being organized for 2025. The director Ty Kim (no relation to the composer) worked with Mike Wallace and Ed Bradley at 60 Minutes where Ty specialized in

investigative journalism. Ty's next two films are about an espionage case with far reaching implications, and a police procedural about art theft.

Director of KCCLA, Sangwon Jung stated, "We want to highlight the life of unknown and yet great composer Earl Kim through this screening". Moreover, he added, "We would like everyone to experience Earl's strong spirit, which has overcome many obstacles and take the time to support many amazing Korean American artists like him".
